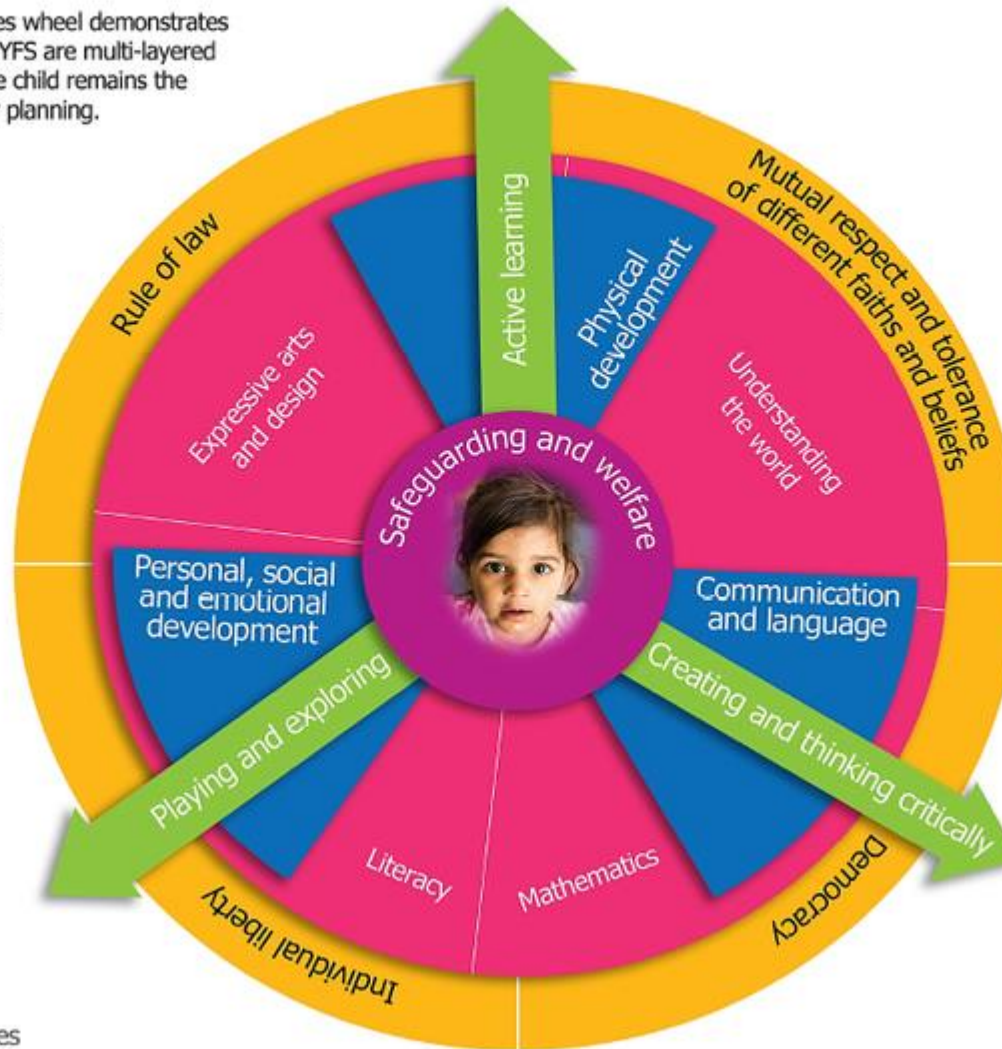


# EYFS and British values wheel

This EYFS and British values wheel demonstrates how the elements of the EYFS are multi-layered and interconnect, while the child remains the focus at the centre of your planning.

The **yellow disk** shows how British Values are embedded throughout the EYFS

The **green arrows** show the different ways in which children actively engage and learn



The **centre circle** shows how each child is unique and at the heart of your practice, while safeguarding and welfare underpins all that you do

The **pink disk** represents the four "specific areas" of learning and development

The **blue segments** represent the three "prime areas" of learning and development

The definition of British Values according to the Department for Education has 4 elements and they are detailed below:

- The Rule of Law
- Individual Liberty
- Democracy
- Mutual Respect and tolerance for those with different faiths and beliefs.
